Mayor Judson Moore presided and called the meeting to order with the announcement that the meeting had been advertised in the annual notice of meetings, that it was not being electronically recorded due to recording machine malfunctioning but that meeting was being held in full compliance of the Open Public Meeting Act.

Mayor Moore asked everyone to rise and join him in the Flag Salute and Lord's Prayer.

Mayor Moore said we have our Station Commander here, Lt. Horsey and he will give us his report.

Lt. Horsey said these statistics are for the month of July 2015, we had 534 service calls, 277 motor vehicle stops, 62 criminal investigations, 1 motor vehicle accident, 30 burglaries. Lt. Horsey said the state police try to stress to homeowners that they keep their properties locked, their out buildings, garages locked, their cars, trucks all vehicles locked. He said anything in your yards that can be stolen and salvaged you should put up. He said they caught some thieves in Maurice River Township recently who stole boat and motor, fire pit.

Committeeman Sutton asked Lt. Horsey if the state was going to make the township install bullet proof glass on all of the windows and doors.

Lt. Horsey said that is what he was told. He said this will be a state expense, not a municipality one.

Mayor Moore thanked Lt. Horsey and said that he had been informed that the residents of Laurel Lake state that they see the state troopers patrolling the roads a lot more now than they did before. Mayor said committee is very thankful for that.

Lt. Horsey said his best time for patrolling in the lake area is when it get dark, after midnight to deter some of the burglaries that go on.

Mayor asked the public if anyone had questions for Lt. Horsey and being none, thanked him for his report and information regarding safety.

Mayor Moore said he would like to invite Lerae Smith to the meeting and said she is a member of our Recreation Committee.

Mrs. Smith said that the recreation committee met on August 12th and discussed some recreational issues and one of them was the skate park. She said that Committeeman Jamison has reported that the younger kids had complained to him about older kids using drugs and being rude to them.

Committeeman Jamison said he had always said the park will be for all of the kids and if there are troublesome events or illegal things going on that he would shut the park down. He said the township is planning to take the light out at the skate park to deter the kids from using it in the evening.

Mrs. Smith said that the recreation committee had decided that each one of them would make a special effort to patrol the park during the day and evenings to try and curtain any activities that they feel in inappropriate. Mrs. Smith said the recreation committee is going to meet on September 9th and discuss a Community Demonstration Day with the purpose being to get the parents and children out to the park for their input on procedures, rules, regulations and safety. She said we want to insure everyone's safety that uses the park and we want it to be a great experience with a lot of fun and we encourage the kids to continue using it. Mrs. Smith said regarding the Community Demonstration Day that they will have food and beverages for everyone, that they would like for the township to print the flyers for the event, that additional trash cans will be needed and where will the bagged trash go.

Committeeman Jamison said that the bagged trash will go into the dumpster by the road garage, that additional trash cans will be available.

Mrs. Smith said we have door prizes and gifts and currently they have ten commitments. She said one of the recreation committee's agenda is to get the older kids show the younger kids. She said she is hoping to get a certified instructor out for the event. She said the recreation committee would like business cards when reaching out for donated items.

Mayor Moore said that the committee is willing to help in anyway that they can and once they get their flyer made up bring it to Hannah and they will print them for you.

Mayor asked Engineer, Edward Dennis for his monthly report.

Mr. Dennis said not a lot for this evening, there is funding available through Small Cities and to keep the drainage program going in the lake he has three resolutions for public hearing on the agenda this evening and applications for Laurel Lake Drainage Phase III has to be filed by September 11, 2015. Mr. Dennis said the Doris Drive and Maurice Street project has gone to the state for approval and if all goes well, they will advertise on September 4th, Bid Opening on 16th and award on 17th.

Mayor Moore said Doris Drive and Maurice Street, these should not be difficult projects because there is no drainage involved and he hoped it would be done by early fall.

Mr. Dennis said he was right, no drainage, they are just waiting on the state approval. He said the Laurel Lake Drainage Phase II, has been completed, close out is in progress. Raymond Drive Phase II construction complete, punch list in progress. Mr. Dennis said Miller, Ogden and Berry Avenue project completed, closeout in progress. Mr. Dennis said there is a meeting on August 26, with NJ State Police to review design for the NJDEP Shore Protection Program. He said the library has been close out and money received by township. The Laurel Lake Drainage Phase I is being closed out with NJOEM and NJ DOT. Berry Avenue Sluice closed out. Mr. Dennis said he has a resolution on the agenda for this evening to rescind designation of Conditional Redeveloper Vanguard Energy Partners for solar project. He said the USDA Port Norris Wastewater Disposal Feasibility Study is done and delivered to township committee on August 17, 2015.

Mayor thanked Mr. Dennis and called on Solicitor, Thomas Seeley for his report.

Mr. Seeley said he is still fighting JP Morgan Chase regarding their complaint on township not subordination agreement. Mr. Seeley said he will continue to fight the complaint to safe guard Bayshore Housing money. He said the Wells Fargo donation of 221 Olive Road has been completed with most costs being recovered from Wells Fargo. Mr. Seeley said the

Talbot In Rem final judgement was received on August 4, 2015. Craig Bessinger redeemed his property and taxes were paid in full. Philip Weldon was notified again to vacate through his tenant regarding foreclosure. List for land sale has been reviewed and notices sent. The Dennis Vacating Final Judgment has been filed with county clerk's office on August 17th, 2015. The Carsello In Rem Title search request for each TSC was requested July 8, 2015, talked with Carolyn at Dominion Title on August 6, 2015. She said that they are working on them and should have some for me to review within next few weeks. He said committee has received two proposals for cell tower, Tower Point and Amercan Tower, it is up to committee to review and make a decision. The Jehovah Witness Building has been finalized, contract delivered to committee.

Mayor Moore thanked Mr. Seeley and stated that Pam Humphries CFO has prepared Bill List for the month of August 17, 2015, and what was the pleasure of the committee.

Committeeman Sutton made motion to approve and Committeeman Jamison seconded the motion with a unanimous all in favor.

Mayor Moore said the committee did not increase the municipal taxes this year but the school did by nine cents on a hundred and so did the fire districts, one cent on a hundred for a total of ten cents per one hundred dollars. He said the school superintendent was good enough to provide the township with a letter of explanation to give to an irate individual that wanted to blame the tax office. Reason for increase school did not include deferred in their 2014-2015 budget and therefore it had to be included with 2015-2016 making for the increase.

Mayor said the Bayshore Center at Bivalve will present "Life On The Bayshore During The Revolutionary War" on Saturday, August 22, 11 am to 4 pm.

Mayor Moore said the following items were discussed at the agenda meeting and will be approved this evening by motion.

- 1. Mayor and Solicitor to collaborate on a complaint letter to BPU regarding Atlantic Electric's lack of response in the lightingat Post Office Facility.
- Authorizing Engineer to prepare proposal for survey of Laurel Lake Community Center Property.
- 3. Authorizing the Mayor to solicit bids for recycling containers.
- 4. Letter of Support for Senate Bill 781-782, clarification of OPRA & OPMA Rules.
- 5. Letter to Mauricetown Fire Company, do not qualify for solar project
- 6. Letter to William Henderson III denying closing of Peek-Of -Moon Road
- 7. That Commercial Township will build dugouts at the ballfield before next season and money will come out of recreation. That Dave Dean will oversee construction.
- 8. Authorizing Engineer to file application for Phase III Laurel Lake Drainage.

Mayor Moore asked for motion.

Committeeman Jamison made motion to adopt and Committeeman Sutton seconded the motion. Roll call vote unanimous.

Committeeman Jamison said that Henderson had told him that he owns half of the road and that he will block that off. Committeeman Jamison said maybe we should have engineer get involved take a look at the situation.

Mr. Dennis said that he would work something up for them.

Mayor Moore said we have an introduction of an amendment to the salary scale ordinance.

RESOLUTION 2015-104

Supporting The County Of Cumberland In Their Petition Before the BPU Regarding Telecommunication Issues That Exist In South Jersey Municipalities

WHEREAS, The County of Cumberland is finalizing its plans to file a formal petition before the BPU on behalf of interested South Jersey municipalities with serious telecommunication issues that exist in the region; and

WHEREAS, Many of South Jersey towns and municipalities are underserved and lack modern and reliable telecommunications service and are being left behind, it is not getting better, it has only gotten worse; and

WHEREAS, Cumberland County's decision to file a petition with the BPU is a great opportunity for towns and municipalities to get together and resolve this werious issue for two reasons:

- First this is an extremely cost effective way to resolve these issues. The Cost will vary between \$1000 to \$2000 each. If 20 municipalities participate The cost will be \$1250 each.
- Second this is a great opportunity to get Trenton and Verizon to listen to our needs of our residents particularly after the severe weather last month in regards to the telecommunications in particular with many residents being without service because of outdated/poor service which harms our residents and local economies. They deserve better.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Commercial that they are supporting Cumberland County's filing a petition with the BPU regarding Telecommunication issues in Southern Jersey; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The Township Committee support the appointment of Theodore Baker, Esq., Counsel for the County of Cumberland in taking the lead for the municipalities participating.

Mayor Moore asked for a motion to adopt Resolutions 2015-96 thru 2015-104.

Committeeman Sutton said I will make a motion to adopt Resolution 2015-96, Resolution 2015-98 through 2015-104, not 2015-97.

Mayor Moore asked Committeeman Sutton for his reasoning for not wanting to adopt Resolution 2015-97, \$3000 Community Forestry Grant.

Committeeman Sutton said this is a matching grant, that means that we have to come up with \$3,000 to match and right now we don't have enough money to pay all of our bills.

Mayor Moore said we do our matching with inkind services that are going to be supplied by our environmental commission. There is no money involved from the township.

Committeeman Sutton and Committeeman Jamison both stated that mayor had originally said it is a matching grant and township will have to come up with \$3,000.

Mayor expressed, no money, inkind services.

Committeeman Sutton said then I'll approve Resolution 2015-97 too.

Mayor Moore said I'll second the vote to adopt Resolutions 2015-96 through 2015-104.

Mayor asked for reports.

Committeeman Sutton said the county has made Hogbin and Buckshutem Roads a four way stop and he agrees that it should be but he feels that the township committee should send a letter to the County Freeholders to install a four way stop light at the corner of Hogbin Road and Buckshutem Road.

Committeeman Jamison said he feels that a light would be a benefit in getting people to be aware that it is a four-way stop.

Mayor Moore said for the clerk to prepare a letter and send it to the county freeholders regarding a four way-stop light at Hogbin and Buckshutem Roads.

Mayor Moore said on next year's ballot the county will have a question on the ballot regarding the funds from Open Space Tax that all municipalities pay, can funds be used for recreational programs and historic sites. Mayor felt township committee is going to have to work hard to get it approved, farmers are not in favor of some of the money being used for recreation. Mayor said he has a meeting with Elliot Lewis and Solid Waste if anyone wants to join him.

Mayor asked for motion to open meeting to the public and with no input asked for motion to close the meeting. It was so moved.
